A. Project Title

From Social Economy to Solidarity Economy: Changing Perspectives in a Volatile World (Phase One)

B. Brief description of project and project objectives, outputs and proposed outcomes

This project focuses on examining the definition of social economy being used by BALTA and critiquing its conceptual capacity to effectively guide policy and practice in a volatile and rapidly changing global context. Describing some key elements of the context from which CED and the Social Economy have emerged over the last 30-50 years as a point of departure, the project will examine the Pearse definition being used by BALTA to guide its mapping work and offer an alternative formulation that cuts the conceptual cloth very differently. The resulting paper, to be done in April, will be used as a basis for consultation with selected practitioners and researchers in Canada and the United States. The results of the consultations will be documented by the beginning of July and be the basis for further work defined in phase two of this project (see Annex A – Project C6 -2007).

Objectives

- 1. To provide a brief overview of the evolution of the social economy and related fields (CED, economic democracy, co-operatives) in Canada and the U.S.
- 2. To present the definition of the social economy being used by BALTA.
- 3. To introduce and elaborate a conception of the solidarity economy which envisages a different conceptualization of the relationship to the public and private sectors.
- 4. To interview several active individuals in various aspects of the field through the Canadian CED Network and the North American Network on the Solidarity Economy (NANSE).

Outputs

- 1. A paper for debate in BALTA, the Canadian Social Economy Hub, and with a variety of networks in Canada, the U.S. and Europe.
- 2. An addendum documenting the results of structured reflections with selected members of CCEDNet and NANSE.
- 3. Academic and Practitioner publication products and web site postings.

Outcomes

- 1. The discussion and debate engendered by this work will provoke clarification of various perspectives existing in the field.
- 2. The practitioner and policy implications of cutting the conceptual cloth differently will initiate a critical discussion of the assumptions, strategies, targets and actors in the field.

C. Purpose and significance of the study, including congruence of the proposed research with the over-all strategic research objectives identified for the SERC and BALTA

The current conception of the social economy outlined by John Pearce and in use as a guide to mapping in the BALTA Alliance depicts the social economy as being one component in the "third system" or, put more commonly, civil society. John Restakis, in his paper related to defining the social economy, refers to the social economy in a way that is inclusive of most of what Pearce refers to as the third system, and similarly he depicts the private and public sectors as being separate spheres, although he clearly indicates that the boundaries are permeable.

This paper will use the current conception of the social economy depicted by Pearce and Restakis as a point of departure from which to formulate an alternate way of conceiving of the three sectors' relationship with each other. In particular, the boundaries of the social and economic landscape within which action is conceived and planned will be challenged, provoking discussion relevant to the scope within which the central feature of the social economy - reciprocity – is applicable.

This paper may also facilitate some clarification of the relationship between CED, social enterprise and the social economy, a debate that has become somewhat contentious of late in Canadian networks (CCEDNet, Imagine Canada, CCA). The depiction of the solidarity economy could provide a measure of clarification, thus facilitating more strategic and operational collaboration between actors in these arenas.

D. Will this project be led and managed by a SERC member or members or will it require a request for proposals?

The project will be led by Mike Lewis in collaboration with Dan Swinney.
